POUKAI 2024

A delegation of Council and staff attended the Poukai at both Aotearoa Pā and Maketū this month. The Poukai were instituted by Kīngi Tāwhiao in



response to the destitution his people suffered following the invasion of the Waikato. This kaupapa endures to this day, and strengthens connections to Kingitanga in support of the pani (bereaved), the pouaru (widowed) and rawakore (destitute). Council further supported this kaupapa and hosted a popup stall at Maketū promoting community funding opportunities, road safety and rates remissions. As Council builds genuine partnership relations with Māori across the district, we will continue to attend and support this kaupapa.



MEET THE TEAM

Paul Strange, Manager Roading

Born and raised in New Plymouth, I had Mount Taranaki, Fitzroy Beach and the Waiwakaiho River as my childhood playground. I am married to

Sue, with two married children who live in the UK and Kenya. I have lived in Te Awamutu for the last 22 years, and I have four grandparents buried in Te Kuiti.

I started working for Ministry of Works in the 1980s, covering State Highway 3 from Awakino and New Plymouth. I then worked for North Shore City Council, on water, wastewater, pump stations, stormwater and recycling in the early 1990's.

I spent the later 1990s in the UK working on landfills, cleaning up contaminated land and making waste disposal arrangements for 650,000 residents.

I came back to New Zealand in 2001 and worked on the State Highway network, covering the area from Waitara to Hamilton Airport in a contracting role.

I then spent a 4-year period at Waitomo District Council looking after their road network, then 17 years at Waipā as Transportation Design and Asset Engineer, as well as looking after their bridges.

I enjoy travelling and exploring areas and cultures slowly, rather than "do 10 counties in 10 days."

I regularly bike around town and walk trails and pathways.

Kakepuku is my favourite exercise venue and I also enjoy kayak fishing or just having a paddle in some sheltered waters.

I joined Ōtorohanga District Council in 2024. It's a real privilege to be looking after the Ōtorohanga Roading network, and I'm looking forward to getting to know the people and the area better.
