POUKAI AT MAKETŪ MARAE

On Monday 13 March, a delegation of Ōtorohanga District Council attended the Maketū Marae Poukai. The Poukai are annual Kīngitanga events that marae across many different regions host. These events were first instituted by Kīngi Tāwhiao, the second Māori King, to support the pani (bereaved), the pouaru (widowed) and the rawakore (destitue) following the invasion and raupatu (confiscation) of the Waikato. To this day, Poukai continue to uphold and support iwi, provide a formal domain for kōrero to be shared, and reaffirm the Kīngitanga.



ŌTOROHANGA FUNDING EXPO

The Ōtorohanga Funding Expo was held on 5 April at Ōtorohanga College. Put on by Ōtorohanga District Council, Ōtorohanga Charitable Trust and the Department of Internal Affairs (DIA), ten funders in total travelled from as far away as Auckland and Hamilton to meet face-to-face with our community volunteers and organisations.
