# WAIPA RIVER ENHANCEMENT

Waikato Regional Council is undertaking some minor river bank stabilisation alongside the section of the Waipā River that runs through the Ōtorohanga township. This includes the removal of trees and selective weed spraying.

The work is being undertaken as part of Te ara a Waiwaiā Waipā River Enhancement programme that involves planting 5975 native plants alongside the river. Planting of a 10-metre wide riparian strip will commence in June 2022.

### **LIBRARY IN-HOUSE PROGRAMMES RESUME!**

Regular in-house programmes have restarted at the Ōtorohanga Library! Pre-schoolers can return to **Storytime on Thursdays at 10.30am** for half an hour of song and stories. If you have a toddler aged up to five years, they will love this programme! The team is looking forward to seeing parents and babies back to their Wriggle & Rhyme programme on Friday mornings at 10.30am. This half hour session is an interactive programme of music and movement that encourages babies' development. Is your child a budding young architect or designer? Then send them along to the **LEGO** club for primary school children, which starts again on the 24th of May at 3.30pm. For adults, the book discussion group meets on the 12th of May at 1.30pm. This hour-long programme is for anyone who loves sharing their great reads with others. Also for the grown-ups is the **adult reading challenge** where you complete a number of reading challenges and compete for weekly prizes and also the grand prize draw! The library team is introducing some great new STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) programmes in the library after school. These will run on a Tuesday and Thursday from 3.30 to 4.30pm and are for children aged 7+. # DO YOU QUALIFY FOR A RATES REBATE?

You may be eligible for a rates rebate of up to \$655 towards your rates if you meet certain criteria.

# **NEIGHBOURS AT WAR? NOT ANYMORE!**

Occasionally the council gets complaints about disruptive activity, and we do our best to find solutions that suit everyone. Recently we were able to help some neighbours in Ōtorohanga, who were having difficulties resolving an issue over parking.

Neighbours of local Ōtorohanga business Pumpn, Norm and Jan Farquhar contacted the council's roading team with concerns about delivery drivers obstructing their driveway, and parking and unloading supplies on the side of Haerehuka Street, causing disruption to traffic flow.

The council approached Pumpn's managing director, Shane Phillips, about the problem and found business had started to outpace their supply and storage capacity, with reduced space creating access problems for large trucks, which were pushed into roadside parking. The council worked with Shane to address the issues and find a positive way forward starting with ensuring delivery drivers kept the live traffic lanes clear whenever they parked outside their site.

Call it good timing, or just good business, Pumpn were then able move into the former RD1 warehouse and depot. Either way, Pumpn now has more storage with ready through-access to Lawrence St for articulated trucks and their bulk deliveries. This has also freed up parking space at their main office building and customers are now able to drive up to the retail showroom. Gone are the days of parking and unloading on the road!

The council's Roading Officer, Jaime McLellan, was delighted that a practical solution had been found for the parking and storage problem. The positive outcome was credited to the council's negotiations, Shane's progressive approach and the patience and understanding of their neighbours.
