1 Purpose | Te Kaupapa

1.1 To hear, consider and provide direction on the feedback/submissions received on the draft Ōtorohanga Rural Concept Plan.

2 Executive Summary | Whakarāpopoto Matua

- The draft Ōtorohanga Rural Concept Plan was available for feedback/submissions from 5 April to 6 May 2024, with community drop-in sessions held in Ōtorohanga on 13 April and Arohena on 18 April 2024 where people could share their views and preferences on the content and direction of the Plan. During this period feedback could also be provided through an on-line survey or separate submission.
- 2.2 In addition to feedback provided at the drop-in sessions, 15 responses/submissions were received with two submitters requesting to speak in support of their submission. To assist with the hearings and deliberations process, the following documents are attached to this report:
 - Submissions from submitters to be heard (appendix 1)
 - Schedule of those wishing to speak, including a summary of key points for all submissions (appendix 2).
 - The 15 submissions received (appendix 3).
 - A report providing an overview and assessment of the final round of engagement (appendix 4).
- 2.3 The feedback/submissions received need to be considered and direction provided as to any changes that should be made to the draft Concept Plan before it is referred to the Council for adoption in June 2024.

3 Staff recommendation | Tūtohutanga a ngā Kaimahi

That, having considered the feedback/submissions received on the draft Ōtorohanga Rural Concept Plan, the Ōtorohanga District Council Hearings Panel recommend the Draft Ōtorohanga Rural Concept Plan to the Ōtorohanga District Council for adoption with the following changes ...

4 Context | Horopaki

- 4.1 The Rural Concept Plan process has involved extensive community/stakeholder engagement and been supported by community and mana whenua advisory groups. Through the course of the project multiple community drop-in sessions have been held in Arohena and Ōtorohanga with concurrent online options for enabling community feedback. Meetings have been held with key stakeholders.
- 4.2 The process followed for the concept plan has involved extensive investigation and analysis, gathering, and reflecting back information on issues, challenges, and opportunities. The resulting assessment of issues and opportunities has culminated in the development of the draft Rural Concept Plan, reflecting key moves and proposed actions. In essence, the draft Concept Plan reflected back to the community what the community has told us was important.
- The draft Rural Concept Plan was released for public feedback/submissions, concurrently with Council's draft Long-Term Plan (LTP) and the draft Kāwhia/Aotea/Ōpārau Concept Plan, over the period 5 April 6 May 2024. This engagement included public drop-in sessions in Ōtorohanga on 13 April and Arohena on 18 April 2024 where people could provide their feedback directly (a similar drop-in session was held in Kāwhia on 20 April). For those unable to attend a drop-in session, an on-line survey provided an alternative option for feedback. Stand alone submissions could also be made.

5 Discussion | He Korerorero

- In addition to the feedback provided at the drop-in sessions, 15 responses/submissions were received, with two submitters requesting to speak in support of their submission. The 15 submissions received, a summary of key points and a schedule of those wishing to speak are attached. Also attached is a report providing an overview and assessment of the final round of engagement, including the feedback provided at the drop-in sessions.
- 5.2 Following the hearing and consideration of submissions, decisions need to be made on the matters raised by submitters. This direction will result in the draft Rural Concept Plan being amended and referred to the Council for adoption at its June 2024 meeting. Where appropriate, to assist with the consideration of submissions, staff comments/recommendations are provided in relation to the matters raised by submitters.
- The adoption of the Rural Concept Plan will not automatically mean every action/project signalled will be progressed as a matter of course. The Rural Plan is one of three concept plans covering the District (Kāwhia/Aotea/Ōpārau Concept Plan and Ōtorohanga Town Concept Plan), so any actions/projects to be led by Ōtorohanga District Council will need to be prioritised against available resourcing noting

that Council's draft LTP includes a proposed budget (\$600K per annum for three years) to support the implementation of all three Concept Plans.

In addition, some of the proposed projects will require further work to establish a clear scope (i.e. nature, extent, timing, and cost) for consideration before any decisions can be made to proceed. Some projects will be led by other groups/organisations, so where these are not reliant on Council resourcing/approval they can proceed as the 'owner' organisation so decides.

Subject: Request for Resealing of Kio Kio School Car Park

On behalf of the Kio Kio School Board of Trustees, we are writing to formally request the Otorohanga District Council consider including the resealing of our school car park as part of its upcoming plans.

The current condition of our school car park has been a growing concern for our staff, students, and parents. The surface has deteriorated significantly over time, leading to safety hazards such as potholes and uneven surfaces. This not only poses risks to vehicles but also to pedestrians navigating the area, especially during crucial times like drop-off and pick-up.

Moreover, the location of our school car park directly off State Highway 3, a main trunk line highway, amplifies these safety concerns. The heavy traffic flow on this highway accentuates the need for a well-maintained car park to ensure the safety of all vehicles entering and exiting the school premises.

Additionally, we would like to bring to your attention that the car park is also utilised by the council once a month as part of their driver reviver program. The wear and tear on the surface is exacerbated by the number of trucks that need to pull over to the side of the road for a well-needed rest. Rested drivers are crucial for preventing road accidents in our community, making the maintenance of the car park paramount.

In the past, Waka Kotahi has advised us to put in gates to stop trucks from using the car park, but emergency services need access. It is used as a layby for many vehicles.

A well-maintained car park is essential for the smooth operation of our school and the safety of everyone accessing the premises. Resealing the car park would not only address these safety concerns but also enhance the overall appearance of our school grounds.

To Ross,

This letter is in regard to the Rural Council Plan involving Tippings Reserve. Otorohanga Pony Club has been very fortunate to have had access and use of these grounds since 1983. We acknowledge and appreciate the support of the Council for us to have had use of these grounds and would very much like for this to be able to continue for many years to come. We have multi-generational families as a part of our club, and it is definitely still thriving and going strong today.

We take pride in the grounds and spend both time and money keeping it tidy and up to a good standard for our members, Otorohanga Adult riding Club and visiting riders.

While we agree that it is a great spot, we definitely have concerns in regard to the 'free access plan' to Tippings Reserve and these are as follows:

1. The tidiness of the property after visitors leave. There is already rubbish and whiteware dumped here on a regular basis, which if people had easy access to the Reserve, it is likely to worsen.









First three photos are of the rubbish that gets left near Tippings reserve currently. The 4th photo is rubbish left at the current river access on Otewa Road. It is already quite an issue, unlikely to improve if there is free public access.

- 2. Damage to the property. Our jumps, shed, equipment and just the grounds in general. This would cost very large amounts of money to fix and have in a useable condition which we just wouldn't be able to do time and time again.
- 3. The leaving of dangerous items such as glass bottles, broken glass, unsanitary items, and other things that are a concern when left lying around at a facility used by children and animals.
- 4. Visitors and other users not respecting what the facility is used for.
- 5. The farmers cows grazing the land. This is carried out by the farmer across the road, and everyone communicates and works well together. This keeps the grass and land

- tidy but if it's accessible to the public at any time and day then can the farmer be confident his stock will be safe? Gates could be left open, stock stolen, rubbish could be left, which is a danger to the stock. All things that we ensure don't happen.
- 6. If we are holding planned rallies, events or have visitors wanting to use the grounds and then there are other members of the pubic there not associated with the horse event this could have the potential to put both parties in an uneasy and potentially unsafe situation which wouldn't be good for anyone.
- 7. Unfortunately, at times wide open, accessible spaces are too much of a temptation to some people, and as the Waipa District Council have experienced with Bulmers Landing and other public reserves, they don't hesitate to go and do burnouts and rip up the grass as well as setting toilets and the likes on fire. This is a huge risk with these grounds if they were made easily accessible and could be just heartbreaking for us.

Recently we had a ram raid at the grounds. This was reported to police, our locked gate was rammed and damaged and they then tried to access out equipment shed. If they had been successful in their attempt to enter the shed, it would have been devastating for us and our members and had a huge impact on future lessons and events. If the grounds were open to the public our equipment and facilities would be at an even greater risk of being vandalized and damaged.

Being able to close the gates and keep them closed while there are horses and ponies on the grounds is essential as there is a huge safety risk to the public and our riders if a horse was to get out onto the road. People don't always shut gates or see why they need to, so with the public being able to have free access we could not make sure the gates were always shut and everything as safe as possible.

There are a lot of past and present community members who have helped make our Club what it is today, and we take a lot of pride in what we are able to offer our members. It would be a real shame if this was to be changed or taken away from these awesome people. We use the grounds a lot for rallies and enjoyment and other people also come and are able to use the facilities but always communicate prior. Pony club caters for a wide age group from 4 years old and over 70 years of age so it's a really neat club to have in our Community for people to be able to be involved in.

On the 21st of April we held our annual Memorial Ribbon Day. We had around a large number of horses/ponies and their riders and families present. People love coming to our grounds and always enjoy the relaxed, fun atmosphere. In November we also held a One Day Event where we also had good numbers attend and they came from Taranaki right through to Auckland and everywhere in between. We love sharing what we are fortunate to have the use of, but we also put loads of time and effort into having the facilities available for these days and also having everything tidy and useable. Again something that could not be guaranteed if the public had free access to the grounds.

Tippings Reserve is a popular venue. We know we are very fortunate to have access and use of these grounds. The public do access the grounds and the river and are able to do this but with having the locked gates it at least reduces what people could potentially do to our facilities and keeps things a little more safe and looked after. The river is a fantastic bonus for us to have access to and the squeals of delight and the memories made at these grounds are ones our kids will have for life. We really would like it to stay this way or be managed in a way that safety was kept paramont, things were able to be looked after and kept tidy, the wonderful farmer and their stock looked after and just for everyone to be able to continue to enjoy our awesome club and the Tippings Reserve.

Otewa Road Otorohanga 4th May 2024 To Ross, This letter is in regard to the Rural Council Plan involving Tippings Reserve. Otorohanga Pony Club has been very fortunate to have had access and use of these grounds since 1983. We acknowledge and appreciate the support of the Council for us to have had use of these grounds and would very much like for this to be able to continue for many years to come. We have multi-generational families as a part of our club, and it is definitely still thriving and going strong today. We take pride in the grounds and spend both time and money keeping it tidy and up to a good standard for our members, Otorohanga Adult riding Club and visiting riders. While we agree that it is a great spot, we definitely have concerns in regard to the 'free access plan' to Tippings Reserve and these are as follows: 1. The tidiness of the property after visitors leave. There is already rubbish and whiteware dumped here on a regular basis, which if people had easy access to the Reserve, it is likely to worsen. First three photos are of the rubbish that gets left near Tippings reserve currently. The 4th photo is rubbish left at the current river access on Otewa Road. It is already quite an issue, unlikely to improve if there is free public access. 2. Damage to the property. Our jumps, shed, equipment and just the grounds in general. This would cost very large amounts of money to fix and have in a useable condition which we just wouldn't be able to do time and time again. 3. The leaving of dangerous items such as glass bottles, broken glass, unsanitary items, and other things that are a concern when left lying around at a facility used by children and animals. 4. Visitors and other users not respecting what the facility is used for. 5. The farmers cows grazing the land. This is carried out by the farmer across the road, and everyone communicates and works well together. This keeps the grass and land tidy but if it's accessible to the public at any time and day then can the farmer be confident his stock will be safe? Gates could be left open, stock stolen, rubbish could be left, which is a danger to the stock. All things that we ensure don't happen. 6. If we are holding planned rallies, events or have visitors wanting to use the grounds and then there are other members of the pubic there not associated with the horse event this could have the potential to put both parties in an uneasy and potentially unsafe situation which wouldn't be good for anyone. 7. Unfortunately, at times wide open, accessible spaces are too much of a temptation to some people, and as the Waipa District Council have experienced with Bulmers Landing and other public reserves, they don't hesitate to go and do burnouts and rip up the grass as well as setting toilets and the likes on fire. This is a huge risk with these grounds if they were made easily accessible and could be just heartbreaking for us. Recently we had a ram raid at the grounds. This was reported to police, our locked gate was rammed and damaged and they then tried to access out equipment shed. If they had been successful in their attempt to enter the shed, it would have been devastating for us and our members and had a huge impact on future lessons and events. If the grounds were open to the public our equipment and facilities would be at an even greater risk of being vandalized and damaged. Being able to close the gates and keep them closed while there are horses and ponies on the grounds is essential as there is a huge safety risk to the public and our riders if a horse was to get out onto the road. People don't always shut gates or see why they need to, so with the public being able to have free access we could not make sure the gates were always shut and everything as safe as possible. There are a lot of past and present community members who have helped make our Club what it is today, and we take a lot of pride in what we are able to offer our members. It would be a real shame if this was to be changed or taken away from these awesome people. We use the grounds a lot for rallies and enjoyment and other people also come and are able to use the facilities but always communicate prior. Pony club caters for a wide age group from 4 years old and over 70 years of age so it's a really neat club to have in our Community for people to be able to be involved in. On the 21st of April we held our annual Memorial Ribbon Day. We had around a large number of horses/ponies and their riders and families present. People love coming to our grounds and always enjoy the relaxed, fun atmosphere. In November we also held a One Day Event where we also had good numbers attend and they came from Taranaki right through to Auckland and everywhere in between. We love sharing what we are fortunate to have the use of, but we also put loads of time and effort into having the facilities available for these days and also having everything tidy and useable. Again something that could not be guaranteed if the public had free access to the grounds. Tippings Reserve is a popular venue. We know we are very fortunate to have access and use of these grounds. The public do access the grounds and the river and are able to do this but with having the locked gates it at least reduces what people could potentially do to our facilities and keeps things a little more safe and looked after. The river is a fantastic bonus for us to have access to and the squeals of delight and the memories made at these grounds are ones our kids will have for life. We really would like it to stay this way or be managed in a way that safety was kept paramont, things were able to be looked after and kept tidy, the wonderful farmer and their stock looked after and just for everyone to be able to continue to enjoy our awesome club and the Tippings Reserve. 

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Executive Summary

Led by the Ōtorohanga District Council (ŌDC) and supported by Beca Limited (Beca), the creation of concept plans for Kāwhia, Aotea and Ōpārau, and rural Ōtorohanga presents a fantastic opportunity to set the direction and future investment in these areas. The two plans cover Kāwhia and the smaller communities of Aotea and Ōpārau and the area around the Kāwhia Harbour, and the rural areas of the district, each with their own identity and aspirations. The town of Ōtorohanga is excluded from these plans, as a concept plan was developed in 2022.

Building off the momentum created by the Ōtorohanga Town Concept Plan, the development of these two concept plans gives these communities the opportunity to voice their vision and aspirations for their communities, recognising the important role and identity these locations bring to the district.

Beca's role has been to lead the development of the concept plans and undertake engagement in partnership with ODC to inform the development of the plans.

This report builds on the previous summary of engagement that focused on the first rounds of engagement - from May – July 2023.

Specifically, this report focuses on feedback received from mana whenua, community groups and the wider public from February to May 2024.

1 Introduction to communications and engagement strategy

1.1 Introduction

How we got to this point.

Feedback from the first two rounds of engagement helped to identify opportunities and aspirations of the community. Opportunities were then assessed against the agreed Outcomes and Principles for the wider Concept Plan project, and the likely high-level cost and complexity of delivering the outcomes identified.

The feedback received relating to the opportunities identified was considered together to confirm the key moves and outcomes for Kāwhia/Aotea/ Ōpārau and rural Ōtorohanga and how these are to be prioritised over the short, medium and long term.

This feedback was then organised into projects and were split into the following 6 themes.

- Transport and Accessibility
- Amenity and Community Connections
- Art, Culture and Heritage
- Three Waters
- Climate Change and Resilience
- Development

Note: The projected future extreme storm tide levels were also included in the outcomes maps in order to consider the risks associated with coastal inundation and sea-level rise when making future investments near the coast. $\bar{O}DC$ are developing, in conjunction with its communities, a Climate Change Response Plan that will consider issues relating to climate change in more detail and signal pathways for action.

Each project was then placed onto large visual maps (see appendix). Mana whenua, key stakeholders and the wider community were then asked to have their say on which projects they would like to see prioritised, in each theme.

1.2 How feedback was gathered

Throughout the engagement period, $\bar{O}DC$ and Beca wanted to hear from the community on their views on the future of their towns, villages or areas including the look and feel, the culture and identity, harbour and environment, transport, community facilities and recreational spaces, and economic future for the next 30 years.

As the project progressed, and the feedback was taken onboard the team was able to create more concise maps ideas and opportunities as individual projects under themes for each area across the two concept plans.

For this phase, feedback was gathered through engagement HQ via an online survey, mana whenua and community advisory groups and at three separate community drop-in sessions.

- 13 April at the Ōtorohanga Library/Village Green
- 18 April at the Arohena Hall
- 20 April at the Kāwhia Community Hall

At these open days, the attendees were asked to identify, using sticky coloured dots, what projects they wanted to see prioritised. Each person having an opportunity to place their dots against projects presented on the maps. This helped to form a picture of what projects were perceived to have more priority by the community.

The online survey hosted on Engagement HQ, asked the community to identify priorities in the same way – this kept the results consistent.

The community was also invited to be heard at a Council hearing and could opt to have their submissions heard when taking part online and at the open days. 18 submitters initially requested to be heard, but at the time of preparing this report that number has reduced to 8. These hearings will take place on the 27th and 28th of May 2024.

2 Summary of mana whenua and stakeholder engagement

Mana whenua and key stakeholders were engaged with regularly throughout the Concept Plan process. This included informing them of the project and determining an understanding of what is important to them.

2.1 Mana whenua engagement

During this phase of the project, the draft Concept Plans were shared and worked through with the Mana Whenua Advisory Group with a focus on the key moves identified and the implementation tables included in each plan. Working through the document, feedback was taken on board and changes made to the draft document as a result of comments provided in this hui.

The feedback generally related to:

- Commitment of ODC to the delivery of these documents.
- Compliance costs
- Papakāinga
- Relationship between Waka Kotahi and ŌDC
- Highlighting and prioritising projects that are important to mana whenua.

Generally, those who attended the working session were supportive of the Concept Plan work to date and gave feedback on the following.

2.2 Kāwhia, Aotea and Ōpārau and Rural Advisory Groups

The Kāwhia, Aotea and Ōpārau and Rural Advisory Groups included representatives from across both communities.

Those who attended the working sessions were generally supportive of the Concept Plan work to date and gave feedback on the following:

- Specific projects and the need to include them, or not.
- Cost of delivery and how this would impact rates.
- Operational costs of projects now and in the future
- The importance of quality resilient infrastructure.
- A need to focus on economic development.
- A need to focus on civil defence for future events.

These questions were addressed on the day or taken into consideration while finalising the Concept Plan documents.

3 Summary of wider community communications and engagement

In addition to feedback from mana whenua, key stakeholders and the advisory groups, consultation has been undertaken with the wider community to understand how the community wanted to prioritise the projects identified and outlined in the concept plan.

3.1 Kāwhia, Aotea and Ōpārau summary

Over **430 pieces** of feedback were received from both our EngagementHQ webpage and survey, and from our Open Day session.

Feedback received during this stage is summarised below. The highlighted projects are those which received the most sticky-dots for prioritisation.

3.1.1 Open day summary

There was one Open Day session for the Kāwhia, Aotea and Ōpārau Concept Plan on 20 April at the Kāwhia Community Hall, where a total of **227** yellow sticker dots, indicating favoured projects, were submitted by attendees.


3.1.2 Survey summary



Graph 1: Combined results of online and open day surveys and sticky dots









Graph 5: Combined results of online and open day surveys and sticky dots





Graph 7: Combined results of online and open day surveys and sticky dots



Graph 8: Combined results of online and open day surveys and sticky dots






















Graph 17: combined results of online and open day surveys and sticky dots




Graph 18: online survey results




Graph 19: online survey results

4 Next steps

Following the consideration of all submissions the draft Concept Plans will be updated to reflect the direction provided from the hearings and deliberations process. Subject to any final changes, the Council will adopt both Concept Plans at the end of June.

The feedback from the community on project priorities will help Council determine what projects will be progressed given the available budget. The budget, which will cover the implementation of three Concept Plans – Ōtorohanga Town, Kāwhia/Aotea/Ōpārau and Rural Ōtorohanga, will be confirmed when Council adopts its 2024-2034 Long-Term Plan at the end of June 2024. Before they can proceed, many projects will require further assessment to establish clarity on matters such as scope, cost, approvals and responsibilities.

These Concept Plans documents provide a long term, 30+ year vision for Kāwhia, Aotea & Ōpārau, and Rural Ōtorohanga, and are to be a 'living document'. It is anticipated that Council will revisit these documents from time to time to check back in with the community to allow the responses and priorities identified to evolve and to be adapted to changes in the desires of the community, the state of the environment, and any legislative requirements. This will also allow the documents to remain relevant to decision making, regulatory requirements and investments managed by Ōtorohanga District Council.
